Regional Information

Located just 30 miles northeast of Austin. Connected to Interstate 35 by Highway 79, Taylor's highway access has always been an asset. Two new state highways (Toll-130 and Toll-45) just 10 miles from our City makes it easier than ever for companies to move goods and people into and out of Taylor.

Education

Taylor Independent School District: The Taylor ISD is a place without limits, full of rich traditions and a proud heritage. With approximately 3,000 students, our ISD is small enough to recognize the needs of each individual student and large enough to address them in creative and effective ways. Taylor is home to three elementary schools, one middle school, and one high school.

Taylor is also home to two private schools, St. Paul Lutheran Elementary School and St. Mary's Catholic School. East Williamson County Higher Education Center, a multi-institutional teaching center, brings together partners Temple College, Texas State Technical College, Texas Tech University, Concordia University Texas, and Legacy Early College High School to provides employers and residents with access to higher education and workforce training.

Greater Austin is well known for its colleges and universities. More than 115,000 college students are enrolled in the MSA's eight universities and colleges. The main campus of The University of Texas is 35 miles from Taylor. The University is the 2nd largest in the nation with more than 50,000 students and is consistently ranked among the top 10 in the country for science and engineering degrees awarded. The University plays an important role in the region's flourishing high tech industry.

Recreation

Destination for Many, Home for a Fortunate Few - Taylor is home to a diverse, entrepreneurial population that embraces family values, hard work, and community involvement. If you enjoy fishing, camping, swimming, or boating, you will appreciate the convenient location of Granger Lake, located only 8 miles from Taylor.

The community offers opportunities to have fun with family and friends at annual events. Highlighting these events are the National Rattlesnake Sacking Championship, the annual rodeo, International barbecue Cook-Off, Bloomin' Festival, Fourth of July fireworks, annual salsa competition, and the Lights of the Blackland Christmas lights display.

Within Taylor, you'll find good shopping and restaurants. The world famous barbecue at Taylor's Louie Mueller Barbecue and Vencil Mares' Taylor Café are a draw for people from across the state and country. Another local favorite, Davis Grocery, always draws a crowd. The charming German style Walburg Restaurant is located just outside of Taylor. Built in 1882, it has been featured in magazines such as Texas Monthly and Southern Living.

Locally-owned antique shops and restaurants line Taylor's downtown streets. Just outside of downtown, residents find shopping convenient at national chains. A short drive into Austin provides residents with every type of shopping, from high-end stores like Nordstrom, Neiman Marcus, and Macy's, to locally-owned favorites like Whole Foods and eclectic boutiques. Retail is also growing in Taylor, as more companies realize that our growing population is ripe for new retail business. We have large retail sites available for new development.
